Wasteful Island

- eyes bigger than stomach
- over ordering
- picking through foods
- scrolling and forgetting
- “convenient” waste

Poor Island

- drinking water to feel full
- eating expired or rotten food

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Food Waste

You're throwing that away?

In this world

Total Annual Food Waste:

- about 1.05 billion tons of food are wasted every year

Daily Loss:

- wastes over 1 billion meals every single day

Per Person:

- on average, each person wastes about 79 kilograms of food annually

Waste Ratio:

- about 19% of all food available to consumers is thrown away

Daily Meal

Breakfast:

- a small bowl of watery cornmeal porridge

Daily Meal

Lunch:

- nothing

Daily Meal

Dinner:

- a small portion of plain white rice and a piece of boiled cassava, served with a pinch of salt

Symptoms

Gnawing Pain

Nausea

Lightheadedness & Dizziness

Irritability

Fatigue & Lethargy



Situation

A lot of people dying

Starvation Death Rate

Total Annual Deaths:

- about 9 million people die from hunger and hunger-related diseases every year

Child Mortality:

- about 3.1 million children under the age of five die from malnutrition annually

Frequency:

- a child dies from hunger-related causes every 10 seconds

Current Hunger Population:

- around 733 million people worldwide face chronic hunger

Related Laws

International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR)

→ Recognizes the "right of everyone to an adequate standard of living, including adequate food" and the "fundamental right of everyone to be free from hunger."

Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR)

→ States that everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for health and well-being, including food.

Related Laws

Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC)

→ Mandates states to combat disease and malnutrition through the provision of adequate nutritious foods and clean drinking water.

Good Samaritan Law

→ A legal principle that protects individuals from being sued or prosecuted when they provide emergency help or donate food in good faith.

Some Solutions Idea

Mandatory Donation

→ We can enact legislation requiring large supermarkets to donate unsold food to charitable organizations, or they will face significant fines.

FJU Food Sharing

→ By opening access to free near-expired food for students and the community, we ensure that these “surplus resources” are no longer wasted.
